From 1974 to 1979, Gokor continued to compete and win championships in Judo and Sambo not only in the Soviet Union, but in Europe and at the World Games. In 1981, Gokor moved to Los Angeles and began training with the legendary “Judo” Gene LaBell.

After competing in numerous “no holds barred” competitions in France, Japan, Thailand, Mexico, Canada, Germany, England and several other countries, the United States Judo Federation helped Gokor acquire his U.S. citizenship in 1987 allowing him to qualify for the U.S. Olympic Team in 1988.

In 1991, Gokor opened Haystan MMA Academy in Hollywood CA and has drawn students from around the world. Haystan quickly established itself as THE place to train for mixed martial arts fighting. Producing champions in the ring, and in life, Haystan MMA continues to set the bar for MMA training and its stable has included several prominent world class fighters. Distinguished Master Instructor

Sifu Andy Kimura has studied and taught Jun Fan Gung Fu / Jun Fan Jeet Kune Do for over 30 years. His father, Sigung Taky Kimura is one of only three people personally certified as an instructor by Sijo Bruce Lee. Andy Kimura is the only student whom Taky Kimura deemed worthy of a full instructorship and a Rank 6 in Jun Fan Gung Fu. Sifu Kimura has shown an impressive mastery of Jun Fan Gung Fu / Jeet Kune Do and has been put through the rigorous training required to obtain this unique distinction.

He was a board member of the Bruce Lee Foundation, a non-profit organization formed for the sole purpose of preserving and perpetuating Bruce Lee's art and philosophy. Currently, he is an advisor for the Bruce Lee Foundation.

Sifu Kimura has learned to appreciate the deeper, philosophical applications of the art that was entrusted to his father. Having lectured and taught thousands all over the United States, Europe, and Asia, Sifu Kimura is an accomplished educator in the areas of health, self-defense, philosophy and human development. He is currently developing a line of educational products that will assist him in spreading the teachings, that his family has kept privately over the decades, to sincere and interested individuals around the world.

In 2019, Sifu Kimura (in partnership with Sifu Matt Emery) presented the first ever, Jun Fan Gung Fu Institute of Seattle Instructors Conference in honor of Sigung Taky Kimura's 95th Birthday.

Taky Kimura

Martial Arts Legend

Sigung Taky Kimura is a Japanese American martial artist who is best known as being one of Sijo Bruce Lee's top students and closest friends. He is a certified instructor in Jun Fan Gung Fu, personally certified by Bruce Lee himself. Taky Kimura was also the best man at Bruce Lee's wedding, and was one of eight pallbearers during Bruce Lee's funeral. Sigung Taky has dedicated his life to promoting and perpetuating the art of Jun Fan Gung Fu / Jun Fan Jeet Kune Do. For over half a century Sigung Taky has quietly passed on the art entrusted to him by his best friend and teacher, Bruce Lee.

Growing up, Taky Kimura and his family were interned in a War Relocation Center (Internment Camp) during World War II, first at Tule Lake and later at Minidoka, due to their Japanese American heritage. Taky Kimura was actually taken to the camp one day before his high school graduation.

Sigung Taky currently holds a 7th level rank bestowed posthumously by Bruce Lee's widow, Linda Lee, by direction of her late husband, Bruce Lee. Sigung Taky was originally the only student under Bruce Lee to be given a 5th level ranking. When Lee closed his schools, Sigung Taky was allowed to continue to teach small classes under the mantra of "keep the numbers low, but the quality high."

To this day, the only person that Sigung Taky has certified as an instructor in Jun Fan Gung Fu is his son, Andy Kimura. Sigung Taky has appeared in many documentaries and films about Bruce Lee in order to help perpetuate his best friend's art and philosophy.

Sigung Taky is still teaching at 95 years old with his son, Andy. They continue to keep the Jun Fan Gung Fu Institute of Seattle alive and well, teaching a new generation of interested and dedicated students. In 2019, Sigung Taky celebrated his 95th Birthday, during the Jun Fan Gung Fu Institute of Seattle Instructors Conference.
